As part of our ongoing focus on the social and emotional wellbeing of our students, this semester each class participated in anti-bullying lessons based on the Bounce Back program.

Each time a character said something mean, students had to wrinkle up their paper heart to represent how mean words impact on others. Each time a character said something kind, students tried to smooth out the paper heart in an effort to repair it.
